## **CASE STUDY**

THE Moat School in Fulham has been blazing a trail in the environmental field by tapping into the creative minds of

young people.

In the first project of its kind, students have been working to develop a range of new ideas designed to clean up the environment. The Schools Eco-Innovation Award programme aims to harness the brainpower of children with learning disabilities, such as dyslexia and dyspraxia, to approach environmental problems from a new perspective

Launched at the Moat School in September, the scheme has already produced several

students - including a plan to bury new homes underground to save on fuel costs, and a mobile phone app to help

allotment holders sell their fruit and vegetables.

Environet, which set up the scheme, will visit the school this week to hear about some of the students' unique ideas and present an award for the

number one suggestion. He said: "These children have creative and enquiring minds, and they see the world from a different perspective. They are often the ones who have the light-bulb moments – but can't articulate their ideas.

"We want to inspire them to come up with innovative design solutions which improve the environment".

The project was aimed at students during the autumn term and has proved such a huge success that another group has carried it on since Christmas

And the school is already looking ahead with a view to expanding the scheme across

Hammersmith and Fulham. Ronda Fogel, Moat School founder, said: "The students have found this project tremendous fun and incredibly rewarding to work as part of a team. We have a very strong enrichment programme but this has been different to

anything we have done before.
"It's been so popular with the students that we are looking to work with other schools in Hammersmith and Fulham to give more children the opportunity to get involved."
